

What Is Social Return on Investment (SROI)—and how will we measure it? To truly understand the value of integrated long-term care (LTC) interventions, we must look beyond financial metrics and consider their broader impacts on individuals, families, and society. In this regard, the Social Return on Investment (SROI) framework has been recently recognised as a relevant tool in providing a more holistic view of value. This framework incorporates social, environmental, and economic costs and benefits. By evaluating outcomes significant to individuals, caregivers, and communities, SROI helps determine the "social value" generated by care systems. Within the BUILD project, SROI will be the key to evaluating person-centred integrated care (PC-IC) ecosystems. This will provide evidence for policymakers and stakeholders, guiding decisions that improve the quality of care,

reduce inequalities, and foster more sustainable solutions.


